## **Course Details:**

Course description	Three major paradigms are known in the study of International political economy: Liberalism (the economic approach), Mercantilism (the state approach) and Marxism (the social approach). This course examines the current international system of trade and finance, the role of multinational corporations in it, and the politics of the resource curse. The social approach will dominate in this course, but it will be contrasted with the economic and state approaches. Special meeting will be devoted to the European and Israeli political economies, and the relations between them.
Learning Outcomes	The objective of the course is to provide students with knowledge regarding the interaction between economic, societal and political factors in the global, European and Israeli political economies.

- 4. The student's view of the quality, value, and contribution of the item
